We could hear about hardships, celebrations, triumphs over illness, and maybe even just some down-to-earth thanks for a church that is just exactly what someone was looking for. We hope many of us will share in this way, for it is through telling our stories that we share God's love and show thanks for all that he does for us. It can be long or short, sad or funny, a big impact or a very small impact- all come from the heart of people we love!

Impact Story

A Giant Leap

Like most folks who move to SLV, this was a giant leap for us. We were drawn to the beauty, the peacefulness, the sense of community, and oh yes- the pretty church on the hill that just happened to be a Lutheran Church that would be familiar and offer something "like home". Within weeks of our arrival, we were cultivated by a couple to join them for lunch after church, then invited to attend a Bible Study, and within just a few months, I was asked to participate in a World Day of Prayer with other women of the church. And then...it all stopped. It was 2020, and everything changed. When the church was forced to close, we felt isolated. Our family was hundreds of miles away, and our next-door neighbors seemed just as remotely untouchable. Because of the generosity of a member of the church, new video equipment was installed the week of the shut-down, and from that very first week, we were able to connect with the church via live-stream with just the pastor inside the church. We were invited for drive-thru Holy Communion, and mid-week Facebook devotionals held us together as a family. Small groups began to meet to take supplies to the homebound, and a group of women organized a Cookie campaign to deliver a Valentine's Day Card with scripture and cookies to 250 mailbox slots. God's Love was not being shut down! Each day brought new opportunities to continue to serve through the church. The challenges were great, but the steps forward brought us all hope for a brighter future. It was amazing how creative we could be amid adversity. Love overcame the sadness of loss, the fear of illness, the uncertainty of the future. God gave us ways to continue to care for each other, and to feel part of a community of faith that needed our gifts to continue on.

I chuckle when I remember my mother's words shortly before her death – "I sure hope Heaven is all it's cracked up to be!" We wondered if SLV and LCBTL would ever again be all that they were cracked up to be, but by God's grace, we have found many ways to serve and find fulfillment in helping to rebuild this vibrant and mission-oriented congregation. Those gifts- being able to serve and worship with this new-found family, finding purpose in a retirement that meant seeking a new rhythm in life – for these things and for God's abiding presence in this pretty church on the hill, we give thanks.

And on Christmas Eve, two candlelight services accompanied by a brass quartet filled the sanctuary with warmth, music, and reverence, proclaiming the good news of Christ’s incarnation to all who gathered.

These examples are just a sampling from the end of the year—truly just a drop in the bucket of all that has defined our ministry in 2024. They represent but a fraction of the countless ways God’s Spirit has moved among us, spurring us to reach out, to serve, and to embody the love of Christ. For more than two decades, since our founding in 1998, this congregation has carried forward the mission entrusted to us: to share the transforming grace of Jesus with a world in need.

As we turn toward 2025, we do so with confidence rooted in God’s promises. Isaiah’s words echo through the centuries, reminding us that God is always doing something new—renewing hearts, mending communities, and guiding us through life’s ever-shifting landscape. Council Tips

At the October Council Meeting the following was approved for inclusion in the LCBTL Operations & Procedures Manual.

Use of Sanctuary

The use of the Sanctuary at LCBTL is to be pre-arranged and approved by the Council for each event, with the protocols distributed to those who will be performing or overseeing any event in the Sanctuary. It is imperative that no matter what the event is that the Sanctuary be treated with respect and that care be given to maintain the sacred purpose of the Sanctuary and to also protect the furniture, carpet, technology, and all other LCBTL components and fixtures. This applies to all services and events, including funerals, weddings, Sundays at Four performances, and any and all other uses of the Sanctuary.

Please note the following:

- No one is to adjust the heating and air conditioning settings except the pastor, the LCBTL Music Director or the property manager or his appointee. It should be returned to the original setting at the end of the service or event.
- The Sanctuary, Narthex and Bridge, will be returned to the condition in which they were found by those who reserved the building for an event or service.
- No adhesive of any kind is to be applied to any wood surface or to the carpet in any of the rooms. This includes any kind of tape, glue, thumbtacks, pushpins, etc.
- The altar is not to be used as a table or surface for any purpose except for a service that includes worship. It is to be slid by two people to the rear of the chancel and returned to its original position in the same manner after an event that requires repositioning.
- The LCBTL sound system is to be operated by a trained and qualified member of the LCBTL Technology Team only.
- The piano is to be moved by two people rolling it out of the way or into position. It should be returned to its original position in the same manner. NOTHING is to be placed on the piano.
- No open containers of beverage other than water, nor any food is to be taken into the Sanctuary.
- Programs, bulletins, or debris of any kind is to be disposed of after the clearing of the Sanctuary. (Trash can is in the Bridge Fellowship Hall)
- Lights are to be turned off and all doors secured at the end of the service or event.

We hope to see you on January 9 and if you have any questions, feel free to call me.

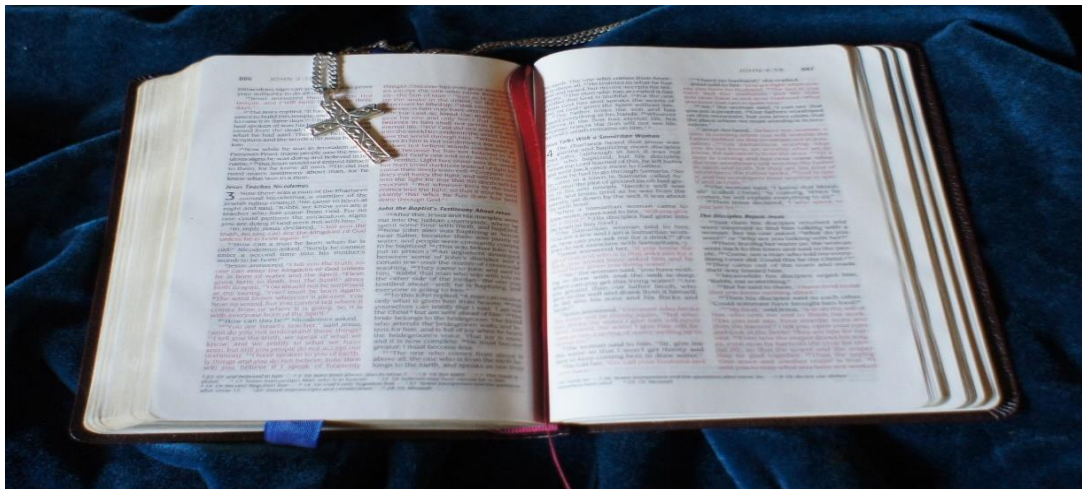

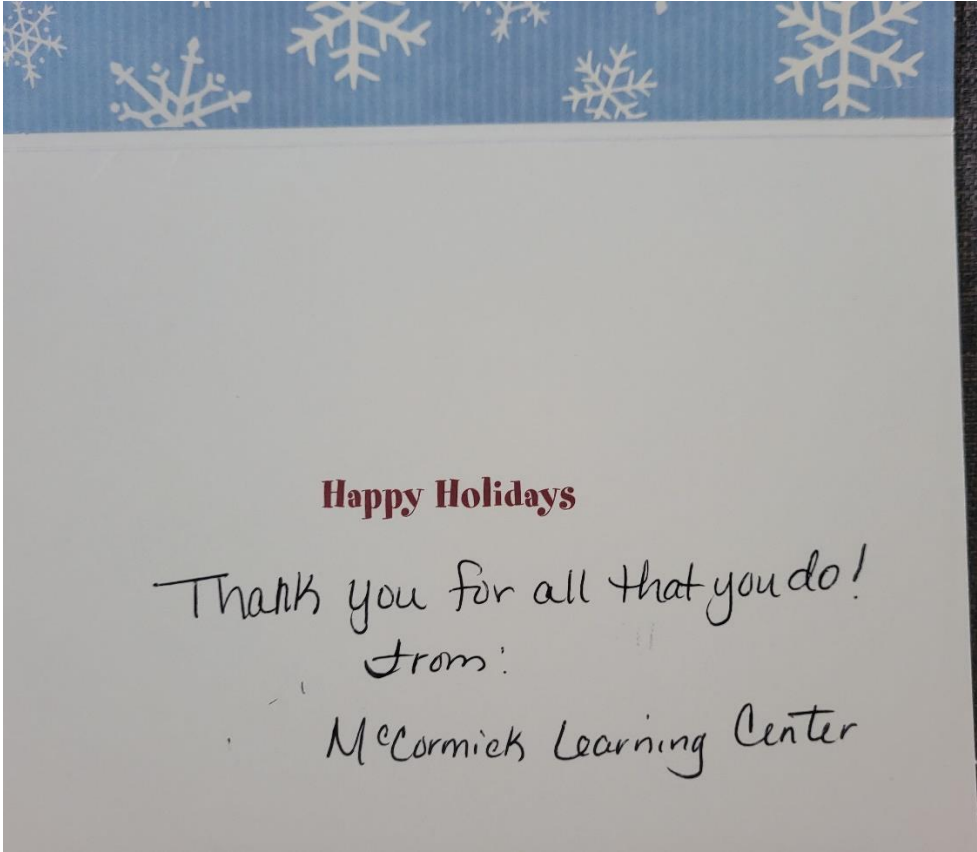

Prayer Shawl



His name was Garde.

I first met Garde while he was on the Rehab Floor at the University of Michigan where our son was a patient. Garde was in a wheelchair and spoke only French. Days after the devastating earthquake that struck Haiti in 2010, Garde'd been rescued from beneath mounds of rubble. His injuries necessitated the amputation of one leg but, far worse, left him a quadriplegic. The team of doctors at U of M that had flown down to assist with earthquake victims, particularly children, took pity on the man with the soulful brown eyes. When they returned to Ann Arbor, they brought Garde with them. Through a translator, I learned one of Garde's biggest regrets was not learning English when he'd had the opportunity. This, combined with his horrendous injuries, made his isolation in a foreign country even more intense. He was eventually assigned the room next to our son's. Garde's desperation quickly became apparent. I wanted to do something, so asked a friend in SLV to send a prayer shawl for me to give him. With the help of the hospital's translator, I explained to Garde that the shawl meant prayers, hugs, hope, and comfort. I still remember that moment, the look on his face knowing others cared, as I fought back tears of my own. One morning our son, Greg, reported he'd been awakened during the night by loud shouting coming from the next room. Later, the nurses told me that Garde's condition had worsened. He needed to be transferred to the ICU, but refused to go without his beloved prayer shawl.

Garde and many others are the reason the Prayer Shawl Circle has existed for nearly twenty years. If you know of someone who is suffering and in need of comfort, please feel free to take and give them one of the prayer shawls available in the bridge. We are always looking to welcome new members into our group. We meet the third Monday of every month in the Bridge from 1:30 to 3:30. We're always happy to help refresh rusty knitting and crocheting skills. Why not give us a try and make discovering Prayer Shawl Circle one of your New Year's resolutions?

I often wonder what became of the man with the saddest eyes I'd ever seen. My last glimpse of Garde was several weeks later when he was being wheeled down a hallway--the prayer shawl securely around his shoulders.

ADVENT TEA

The Eighth Advent Tea was held on December 11th. We had about 90 guests and everyone had lots of complements and praise for the day.

We began in the sanctuary with Linda Wakefield talking about the Chrismons on our trees, followed by beautiful music provided by the Savannah River Singers, led by Karen Spilker.

Then the guests went through the beautiful displays of the Nativity Experience which were provided by members of the church and friends. This is always a special event.

Everyone then went into the Ark for the Tea. The tables were decorated so pretty, we even had napkins folded like a Christmas Trees by the members of the committee. The Lutheran Men in Mission were the servers for the ladies. They were handsomely dressed and service was excellent. We had little sandwiches, fruit and fancy desserts plus a variety of teas, all made by the committee.

The gals on the committee were Karen Divita, Joanna Feloni, Gloria Bramble, Sandy Granger, Tracy Hutchinson, Susan Mazurka, Debbie Frederickson, and Ann Francavilla, Cheylyn Johnson and me, Jean Randall. The Advent Tea had a bonus of \$500. This amount was divided between First Steps Program and the Scholarship fund in Shirley Quarrels name.

It was a pleasure to plan, decorate, and present the Advent Tea this year. My hope is someone will decide to plan one for 2025. This is a special event for the women of the LCBTL.
